

Government plans for Valletta to be aired at Notte Bianca

As the white sheets are given another airing, and the customarily dimly lit streets and ancient walls are illuminated, Valletta comes alive once again under the spell that is the annual Notte Bianca.



As many descend upon the capital for a night of absorbing its history and culture, coupled with a dose of entertainment, this is the perfect time to exhibit the government's plans for Valletta.

A leaflet listing all planned and completed projects and restoration exercises for Valletta, prepared by the Office of the Prime Minister, will be distributed during tonight's Notte Bianca activities.

The projects range from the much-awaited and discussed City Gate projects to the restoration of churches and facades. The leaflet provides a comprehensive list of all that has been completed, and what is still in the pipeline for Valletta.

The government's investment in the rehabilitation and restoration of Valletta is very much in sync with its central objective of safeguarding jobs, and creating new ones. The main projects in particular will be creating hundreds of jobs.

All these projects will increase the overall value of Valletta as a touristic product, as they improve the capital city's attractiveness and stature.

The proverbial cherry on the cake is the investment that has taken place at the Lower and Upper Barrakka Gardens, Hastings Garden and the Valletta Waterfront.
